Arts Council England Publication scheme

The Freedom of Information Act requires all public authorities to have a Publication Scheme. Arts Council England has adopted the Information Commissioner's Model Publication Scheme.¹

This publication scheme commits an authority to make information available to the public as part of its normal business activities. The information covered is included in the classes of information mentioned below, where this information is held by the authority. Additional assistance is provided to the definition of these classes in sector specific guidance manuals issued by the Information Commissioner.

The scheme commits an authority:

- To proactively publish or otherwise make available as a matter of routine, information, including environmental information, which is held by the authority and falls within the classifications below.
- To specify the information which is held by the authority and falls within the classifications below.
- To proactively publish, or otherwise make available as a matter of routine, information in line with the statements contained within this scheme.
- To produce and publish the methods by which the specific information is made routinely available so that it can be easily identified and accessed by members of the public.
- To review and update on a regular basis the information the authority makes available under this scheme.
- To produce a schedule of any fees charged for access to information which is made proactively available.
- To make this publication scheme available to the public.
- To publish any dataset held by the authority that has been requested, and any updated versions it holds, unless the authority is satisfied that it is not appropriate to do so; to publish the dataset, where reasonably practicable, in an electronic form that is capable of re-use; and, if any information in the dataset is a relevant copyright work and the public authority is the only owner, to make the information available for reuse under the terms of the Re-use of Public Sector Information Regulations 2015, if they apply, and otherwise under the terms of the Freedom of Information Act section 19.

The term 'dataset' is defined in section 11(5) of the Freedom of Information Act.

The term 'relevant copyright work' is defined in section 19(8) of that Act.

The Publication Scheme is a document that describes the types of information that we routinely publish, where you can find the information and whether we charge for supplying it. It is not a list of our publications nor is it a list of every document that we hold.

Arts Council England is committed to routinely publishing information and, where possible, providing quick and easy access to material without any need for a formal written request. We do this by publishing as much information as we can through our website, which is designed to function as the key source of our Publication Scheme.

This scheme lists the different types of information that we routinely make available. The scheme is divided into seven categories which describe the general headings under which information is published; each category is further divided into sub-categories for ease of access.
